#### **REPORT: FINANCIAL UPDATES**

Interim Chief Financial Officer Bill Saraceno provided updates, including information on future plans related to the Bookstore and food service provider. He provided an overview of the financial statements from July 1, 2015 – June 30, 2016 noting that "financial statements do not provide assurances; state auditors will do the assurances" and an overview of the College's bank statement.

Colleges that do not expend its minor repair allocations, have to return the unexpended dollars to the state. The College has expended its allocation by completing minor repair projects.

Note: There was a seven-minute break (5.28 PM - 5.35 PM) during Interim Chief Financial Officer Saraceno's report when Trustee Pellham had to step away from the telephone.

#### **REPORT: AGC BIOLOGICS**

Executive Dean Guy Hamilton spoke about the growth of the life science industry in the state and the proposal for the College to work with AGC Biologics to "forge a long-range workforce training and education partnership to meet the needs of a rapidly expanding Biomanufacturing industry."

#### REPORT: SHORELINE PRESIDENT

President Roberts distributed the *President's College & Community Engagement* report (June 27 – July 16, 2019) and provided updates related to ctcLink, the residence hall (7000 Campus Living), and having two presenters, John Boesenberg from the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges (SBCTC) and a state economist, speak at the first campus budget update meeting in the fall.

July 17, 2019

Good Afternoon.

I want to thank you for the lovely plaque you awarded me while I was away in June. I also want to congratulate Trustee Gidget Terpstra for her recognition today and say that I have appreciated her warm and friendly welcome when we sat side-by-side this past year. It made a great difference to me.

As this is the last E-Board meeting I expect to attend as President of the Shoreline Faculty Union, I just want to say that it has been a long and difficult two years for all of us at the College, and I anticipate that next year will be even more difficult with the discussions around the budget and RIF's and laying off classified staff, faculty and administrators.

I hope that decisions will be made with compassion and fairness and transparency. On behalf of the faculty, I want to just say for the record that we did not create the budget crises, and we should not be made to suffer or sacrifice our livelihoods because of it, but I know many of us will. We showed up. We did our jobs, and I want that to be taken into consideration. I expect you will be offering early retirement packages, tenure buyouts, and other incentives, and I am asking that what is offered to faculty and staff is comparable to what administrators who leave this College have been offered.

I leave my position with a heavy heart because of the opportunity missed. Being an African American woman, I was excited to be the Union President when we had an African American woman College President and a diverse Board of Trustees. I thought that together we could move this College towards a more diverse and equitable future as it is a passion of mine and I believe to be of Dr. Roberts'. Unfortunately, instead, we became mired in ULPs and Budgetary issues and lost the chance to move this College forward. In fact, in some ways, I feel we've gone backwards.

However, I'm encouraged because Dr. Eric Hamako is going to be the next Union President. His values align with mine in many ways, and he may be even more capable of transitioning this College to a more equitable, inclusive and diverse campus as he has more knowledge and expertise in that area. I hope we do not

lose another opportunity to carry forward this shared mission of the College and Union.

Eric is tough, and he will hold himself, the Union, the administrators, and the BOT accountable. He's also fair and reasonable and is focused on achieving desired outcomes. He believes in working together to achieve common goals. Under his leadership, I suspect the relationship between the Classified and Faculty Union will be stronger as we all work together to weather the difficult times ahead. Hopefully, Eric will also be successful in rebuilding trust and confidence between faculty and this Administration and the BOT. That, of course, is not just up to him. It is up to all involved.

I look forward to going back to being a fulltime professor and part-time agitator. I want to thank you once again for approving my sabbatical. Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to speak at each meeting and share my concerns over the last 4 years. I appreciate that you taking actions to address some of the concerns I brought to you and for being more diligent regarding the financial situation at the College. It makes me think something positive has been accomplished during my tenure as SCCFT President and gives me more confidence in the future health of Shoreline CC.

#### **Background**

The Washington ACT Transforming Lives Award(s) recognize current or former students whose lives have been transformed by attending a Washington State Community or Technical College (CTC). One current or former student from each of the thirty-four Community and Technical Colleges will be nominated by the current or former student's respective college's Board of Trustees based on the following criteria:

- A current or former Washington community or technical college student (within 3 years of completing a degree, certificate or transfer); or
- A current student who is making significant progress toward completing a degree or certificate that is helping her/him/they prepare for success in her/his/their future endeavors.
- The nominee must share in written format (maximum <u>600</u> words) about overcoming barriers to achieve higher education goals and how the education and support received at her/his/their community or technical college was life transforming.

The ACT Awards Committee will select a total of five individuals (awardees) from the nominations submitted by the CTCs and each of the five awardees\*, will receive a \$500.00 (five-hundred dollar) monetary award and serve as a keynote speaker at the February 17, 2020 Transforming Lives Awards Dinner in Olympia, WA. In addition, the ACT will invite all thirty-four of the colleges' nominees to attend the February 17, 2020 Transforming Lives Awards Dinner. (\*Note: Previous awardees are not eligible.)

Nominations from the campus are due to the Office of the President no later than 5:00 PM on Wednesday, October 30, 2019. The packet containing information on the Board's nominee is due to the ACT office by Friday, November 8, 2019.

#### Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees identify two (2) members of the Board to review the nomination submissions and recommend the Shoreline Community College Board of Trustees' nominee for the 2020 ACT Transforming Lives Awards to the ACT Awards Committee.
